# WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING.

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*To Walter H. Winslow, a Constable of the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cumberland.* GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs to meet at the Town House in said Town, on the sixth day of March, 1893, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit :

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor, Treasurer and School Supervisor.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the Town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools and the poor, and the repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the pay of Town Officers.

Seventh. To see what method the Town will adopt to repair the highways for the ensuing year.

Eighth. To see what the Town will allow per hour for the labor of men, horses and oxen, on the highway.

Ninth. To see if the Town will vote to make a discount of one per cent. or more on all taxes paid within a stated time, and raise money for the same.

Tenth. To see if the Town will vote to choose a Superintending School Committee instead of Supervisor of Schools.

Eleventh. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to change the location of the travel part of the highway, near the residence of Bela Blanchard, or act anything relative thereto.

Twelfth. To see if the Town will abate the highway tax of Fred W. Merrill, and exempt him from further highway tax.

Thirteenth. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase one or more gravel pits for the use of the Town, and raise money for the same.

Fourteenth. To see what action the Town will take to protect its clamming interests, and make all necessary rules and regulations therefor.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said Town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town office at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

## Financial Condition of Town.

### ASSETS.

# School Report.

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*To the Citizens of Falmouth :*

In summing up the work of the past year, it is a pleasure to be able to say that we have had some excellent schools. Still they are not up to the standard we desire. We are decidedly of the opinion that our schools might be, and therefore ought to be, better, and the question arises, what can be done to improve them most ?

While we have desired to do what we could to make successful all the schools under our supervision; yet we have found it beyond our powers to do this in every case. Having no voice in the choice of teachers for the various districts, except in the matter of issuing certificates to those who appear before us for examination, we have seen, during the year, in some instances, the wrong teacher in certain schools; and where in a different situation and under different influences, a success might have been achieved, we were obliged to witness a complete or partial failure. Our agents should be very careful in the selection of teachers, choosing only those known for their ability to teach and govern.

We believe a good, live, energetic teacher, once acquainted with the school and the disposition of the scholars, can do a great deal more for their advancement than new teachers. Therefore, we heartily indorse the good judgment shown in this respect by some of our agents the past year. One evil largely prevalent in our schools; in some more than others, is tardiness. Many teachers will tell you that there are some scholars who are seldom, if ever, in their seats in season. This is a much more serious matter than is generally supposed. It exerts an injurious effect upon the whole school. The scholar that is always behind time in reaching school, is almost always behind hand in his lessons. Late at school may be a little better than never, but it is only a little.

Parents, we urge you, as we have often done before, to a deeper interest in our schools. Let us have this and our schools as they are, are doubled in value. We fear some of you shirk responsibility here and leave the mental and moral training of your children at school to others.

An hour or a day's absence is a loss. There should be mutual co-operation of parents, agents and teachers. Parents should co-operate with teachers in securing attendance and supporting discipline.

In conclusion, we have only to thank you for favors shown us the past year, and to add that however we have failed to secure your approbation, we have conscientiously tried to perform the duties required of us to the best of our judgment, and we hope you will excuse any and all errors that we may have committed.
