#### FINANCIAL.

We shall make two grades of Schools in Summer and three grades in Winter.

The Summer Schools in Districts Nos. 1, 5, 10 and 12, but little fault could be found with them ; good order was sustained throughout the entire term ; a good interest was manifested by teacher and scholar, and a marked improvement was the result.

The Summer Schools in Districts Nos. 2, 3, 6 and 7, notwithstanding there was an improvement, yet, there was not that interest manifested in the school, or that unity of feeling between teacher and scholar, which is indispensible to insure a profitable session.

The Winter terms in Districts Nos. 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 9, 10 and 11, were well managed, and it would be difficult to decide which is the banner school; in each of these schools much credit is due to all concerned.

The Winter terms in Districts Nos. 7, 8 and 12, were not quite so satisfactory; yet a fair improvement was made in each of them.

Your Committee are of the opinion, that the School in District No. 3, was a failure in nearly every respect; and do not hesitate to say, that the sho ter such schools are, the better.

vith one exception our School Houses are in good repair and ite convenient; in this respect Falmouth is second to no other Yown in this County.

Although the deportment of the several schools in town was not satisfactory in every case, yet, your Committee have not been called upon to settle any serious difficuly during the year.

Your Committee have tried to interest themselves in the welfare of the soveral schools in town, and have endeavored to discharge their every duty to promote the cause of education.

Superintending School Committees cannot guarantee a good school in every district, they may suggest, recommend and assist very much, yet, without a good teacher, and an effort on the part of the scholars, a good school is impossible.

An extra effort has been made by your Committee during the past year, to have writing taught in all the schools in town, and see that it was made an every day exercise; and although their efforts in every respect was not crowned with success, yet, we feel that our labors in this direction have not been in vain.

Parents, permit us once more to remind you of the importance of the education of your children.

When we know that the law is as fixed as the Heavens, that whatsover we sow, that shall we also reap, how important it is that we sow good seed; how true the adage; that as the twig is bent the tree is inclined. How important then, that we use every effort, to have the twig bent aright. When we realize that the children and youth of the present day, are ere long to take our places, and discharge our duties, how important that we prepare and qualify them, (so far as in us lies,) to discharge their duties to themselves, to their county and to their God, in such a manner, that He who does all things well, will look down upon them with an eye of approbation. And when we know that the paths of virtue, are the paths of peace and happiness, how important too, that we teach them to be good and virtuous, and that honesty is the best policy.

Now, in as much as good male teachers are very scarce, we would recommend that agents employ good female teachers, in preferance to dead male teachers, as several of our winter schools have been during the past winter taught by females very successfully. And in conclusion we wish to suggest another idea, in regard to parents visiting schols; in a very few instances, som, of the parents have been present at the closing examination, and w would recommend it in all cases. If the teacher and scholars knowthat at the close of the school, all the parents are coming in to see that they have been doing, it will induce the teacher to be apt, and thorough, if they wish to become popular, and the scholars to be studous a:d attentive during the term, if they have any regard for the beelings of their parents; and we hope in the future that parents vil look at it in the same light, and that instead of being an exceptor it shall be the general rule for parents to visit their schools at eat once during the term.
