Warrant for Town Meeting.

To James E. Merrill, a Constable of the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cumberland, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town, on the fourth day of March, 1895, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting. Second. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor, Treasurer and Supervisor of Schools.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the Town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools and the poor, and the repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the pay of Town Officers.

Seventh. To see what method the Town will adopt to repair the highways for the ensuing year.

Eighth. To see what the Town will allow per hour for the labor of men, horses and oxen, on the highway. Ninth. To see if the Town will vote to make a discount of one per cent. or more on all taxes paid within a stated time, and raise money for the same.

Tenth. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest, and how much per cent. on all taxes not paid within a stated time, from the time of commitment.

Eleventh. To see if the Town will authorize and direct the Selectmen to take possession of, and hold for, and in behalf of the Town, such parcels of real estate as the Town shall have acquired title to under sales for non-payment of taxes or otherwise, and as the Selectmen shall deem it for the interest of the Town to so take and hold.

Twelfth. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell parcels of real estate which they may so take and hold, on such terms as they may deem to be for the interest of the Town, and to execute and deliver for, and in behalf of the Town, proper deeds for the same.

Thirteenth. To see if the Town will vote and authorize the Collector to collect all taxes committed to him, within one year from date of commitment.

Fourteenth. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to hire money upon a written order from the Selectmen, in such sums as in their opinion may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town, or act anything relative thereto.

Fifteenth. To see if the Town will vote to lower the grade of "Abbott's Hill," so called, on Old Gray road, and raise money for the same.

Sixteenth. To see if the Town will vote to lower the grade of "Pound Hill," so called, and raise money for the same.

Seventeenth. To see if the Town will vote to build a schoolhouse at Pleasant Hill, and raise money for the same.

Eighteenth. To see if the Town will vote to hire the schoolhouse at Pleasant Hill, for a term of years.

Nineteenth. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the schoolhouse at Pleasant Hill, now controlled by Trustees of Graves' Fund, and raise money for the same.

Twentieth. To see if the Town will vote to establish the bounds of the "Foreside road" so called.

Twenty-First. To see what action the Town will take to protect the clamming interests, and make all necessary rules and regulations therefor.

Twenty-Second. To see if the Town will vote to have a new valuation taken the present year.

Twenty-Third. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit smoking in the voting room during elections.

Twenty-Fourth. To see if the Town will vote to grade the hills and gravel Mill Creek Bridge, and raise the sum of two hundred dollars for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said Town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have the names entered upon said list, at the Town office at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of meeting.

School Report.

Whole number of scholars, Total length of each school, 438 34 weeks

Fellow Citizens:

Again it becomes our duty in performing the labors of a responsible office, to which you have repeatedly called us, to submit a report of our schools for the past year.

In making a general review, we are glad to say that no serious difficulty has occurred, and with few exceptions everything has passed pleasantly; in some instances there has not been so much accomplished as we had hoped for, while in others, our expectations were fully realized.

Never within our knowledge of the schools has there been so much sickness among the scholars, and teachers as well, as we have experienced the past year; and of such a nature as to keep many of them out a part, and in some instances, the whole of a term, seriously affecting the progress and lowering the average attendance.

By reference to the table you will find some of our schools to have been very small—too small to be profitable, and we would, at this time, present for your careful consideration the question of lessening the number in the near future.

In the effort to secure better schools, we are met by a great hindrance — the lethargy of too many of the people upon educational matters. They will vote money for the schools, but there their responsibility and interest seem to end. As for us, we would urge less money and more enthusiasm. In many families there seems to be but little

home stimulus. The child is sent to school because that seems to be the proper thing to do at the opening of the term. A word to parents may not be out of place here. Look after your children and see that they are punctual at school, and that in good season. Tardiness is a pest to the school room. Encourage them in their studies, and when possible visit the school and see for yourselves how your children are getting along. Have you any better interests? But above all, do not find fault with the teacher in the presence of scholars: if any serious difficulty exists, have an investigation by your committee rather than take your children out of school or injure it with ill reports.

In conclusion, fellow citizens, we hope we may more fully appreciate the importance of our public schools, and endeavor to discharge our several duties faithfully in the cause of popular education.
