Warrant for Town Meeting.

To Walter K. Swett, a Constable in the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cumberland.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house, in said town, on the seventh day of March, 1898, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor, Treasurer and Superintendent of Schools.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, and the poor, and the repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the pay of Town Officers.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to make a discount of one per cent. or more, on all taxes paid within a stated time, and raise money for the same.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to charge interest, and how much per cent. on all taxes not paid within a stated time from the time of commitment.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, on a written order from the Selectmen, to hire on the credit of the town, such sums of money, as in their opinion, may be necessary to meet the liabilities and current expenses of the town, or act anything relative thereto.

Tenth. To see what action the town will take to protect its clamming interest, and to make all necessary rules and regulations therefor.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to build a new town house, and raise money therefor.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to procure a new fire proof safe for the keeping of the town records, and raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to accept the road from the present terminus of the road leading past the house of Fred Marston, at a point near the division of property of Fred Marston and A. F. Minott, to the dwelling house of A. F. Minott.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as revised and prepared by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Clerk.

Fifteenth. To see what instructions, if any, the town will vote the Road Commissioner or Selectmen, or both, in relation to the repair of the highways, bridges and culverts.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote and choose a committee to thoroughly examine school house No. 10, with the view of remodeling the same, or to select a lot for a new school house and outbuildings. In either case to give in detail an estimated cost of same. Said committee to report at the next annual town meeting.

Seventeenth. To see if the town will vote to establish a free high school, and raise money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the town office, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT

Whole number of scholars, 450. Greatest number attending, 298. Total length of each school, in weeks, 29

To the Citizens of Falmouth:

In making this annual report of our schools, I am able to say the past year has been one of satisfactory prosperity. Although there have been elements which have impaired, in a measure, the usefulness of some schools, yet considered as a whole, they have done good work.

At the opening of the year it became evident that repairs were needed on many of our school buildings, in some instances quite extensive, namely, at Nos. 1, 2 and 6, with slight repairs also at Nos. 4, 9 and 10, and painting the outside of Nos. 7 and 8.

The new house built this year for No. 12 school is a substantial building and is highly appreciated by the scholars and community. Much credit is due the pupils of this school for the disposition they have already shown of a proper regard for public property and a feeling of responsibility for its care and preservation. Through the efforts of teacher and pupils, No. 7 school has been provided with a bell.

In the matter of text books, as considered by your Committee, it was decided that inasmuch as many of the smaller grades of books, particularly the readers, had become badly worn and soiled by the seven years' use, to discard them

and substitute Cyrs'. For similar reasons a change was made in the speller and primary arithmetic. We would urge upon the parents the necessity of greater home influence to be exercised by our children in the care of our books and school property in general. In fact, we believe that home influence—perhaps better, home training, together with the sentiment which exists in the community, have much to do with the success or failure of a school. No school is doing its best work until its importance is recognized and a certain amount of stimulus given in its support by the community. If this interest and sympathy are wanting the school will fall but little short of a failure.

In conclusion, we commend our schools to the wise and generous regard of our people, on whom rests the responsibility of their success. By means of them we hope to make better men and women and raise the standard of education.

Thanking the many who have shown a common interest in our labors the past year, I submit this report for your perusal.
