Warrant for Town Meeting.

To James E. Merrill, a Constable in the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cumberland.

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house, in said town, on the sixth day of March, 1899, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor, Treasurer, and Superintendent of Schools.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, and the poor, and the repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the pay of Town Officers.

Seventh. On petition of H. M. Sargent, to see if the town will vote to sheathe the walls and ceiling and lay a hard-wood floor, also to have new desks and chairs, in place of those now in use in schoolhouses in Districts No. 1 and 2, and raise money for the same.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to make a discount of one per cent. or more, on all taxes paid within a stated time, and raise money for the same.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to charge interest, and how much per cent., on all taxes not paid within a stated time from the time of commitment.

Tenth. To hear the report of the committee chosen at last annual meeting to examine schoolhouse No. 10.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to pay outstanding notes and raise money for same, or act in any way relative thereto.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, on a written order from the Selectmen, to hire on the credit of the town, such sums of money, as in their opinion, may be necessary to meet the liabilities and current expenses of the town, or act anything relative thereto.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to exempt the new Pythian hall from taxation.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to build a new town house, and raise money therefor.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will vote to procure a new fire-proof safe for the keeping of the town records, and raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the road leading from Presumpscot village to the electric plant or falls (so-called) of the Westbrook Electric Light and Power Co., beginning at a point where said road enters land of above Co., and terminating at the river near the power house of said Co. Seventeenth. To see what action the town will take to pay bill of H. K. Norton for clay taken from the side of the road adjoining his land, to grade cottage lot of Mr. Morse, by permission of A. F. Minott, Road Commissioner.

Eighteenth. To see if the town will vote to allow Jacob Merrill and others, to erect a set of hay scales at Falmouth Corner.

Nineteenth. To see what action the town will take to protect its clamming interests, and to make all necessary rules and regulations therefor.

Twentieth. To hear and act upon the request of any Collector relative to any uncollected tax.

Twenty-first. To see if the town will authorize and direct the Selectmen to take possession of, and hold for, and in behalf of the town, such parcels of real estate as the town shall have acquired title to under sales for non-payment of taxes or otherwise, or act anything relative thereto.

Twenty-second. To see if the town will elect a Superintendent of schools.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session

for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the town office, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT.

Whole number of scholars, 464. Whole number attending school, 304. Average number attending school, 256. Length of school in weeks, 30.

To the Citizens of Falmouth:

In accordance with the law, and an established custom, the following report of the condition of the schools of Falmouth is respectfully submitted.

At no time in the past has the education of our children claimed the attention of the citizens of Falmouth so generally, as at the present time. In looking over the registers we find that fifty-nine visits have been made by citizens during the year, and on enquiry, nearly all of these were made the last day of school. We are glad the parents are interested in the rhetorical exercises, but what our schools of to-day need more than anything else is more frequent visits from parents who are interested in the general work and progress of our children.

Your committee employed the same teachers throughout the year, as far as circumstances under their control would allow, and a marked improvement can be seen in nearly all of our schools, which can be attributed to the employing of good, efficient, tested teachers.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

During the past year but few repairs have been made. The most extensive were made at No. 5, which was the putting in of a new ceiling. This building must be painted outside the coming year. The house at No. 4, must be thoroughly repaired, if a school is to be continued there, and your committee do not deem it advisable to suspend, as the school the past year has been very successful, and should be continued. We have called for an appropriation large enough to cover the above improvements, and we hope the town will grant it. Your attention is also called to the article in the warrant in regard to Nos. 1 and 2. The floors in these houses, also in Nos. 3 and 6, are in bad condition, some of them worn through in several places, and the cracks from $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch wide. As a sanitary measure this should be looked after, as it is impossible to keep the rooms reasonably free from dust, with the floors in this state.

THE COURSE OF STUDY.

By advice of the Superintendent and the vote of the committee, the course of study, as outlined by our State Superintendent, was adopted at the beginning of the year. This has not been carried out as we desired, but as Falmouth, Cumberland and No. Yarmouth have adopted the same for trial, we advise its continuance the coming year, and a more thorough trial given it, and if successful, it will be laid before the town for adoption next year.

TEACHERS' MEETINGS.

By the union of several towns a "Union Teachers' Association" has been formed, and four meetings held the past year. The third meeting was held at Falmouth Corner, and we believe the interest awakened at that meeting has been productive of untold benefit to our town. Our teachers have been encouraged and helped, and have returned to their work stronger, and with more enthusiasm.

In closing, I wish to urge parents to encourage their children. They need it; and it will be a passport to the best positions in the land. They will then leave our schools, a credit to the efforts put forth, the pride of the home, in fact, possessing the requisites for becoming honorable American citizens.

I wish to thank the teachers who have kindly co-operated with me in this work, the scholars for their hearty goodwill, the parents for their words of encouragement, and the members of the School Board for their much needed assistance and advice.
