Warrant for Town Meeting.

To John F. Williams, a Constable in the Town of Falmouth:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on the sixth day of March, 1911, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, Overseers of Poor, Assessors, Treasurer, and Superintendent of Schools.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools and the poor, and the repairs of roads and bridges, and defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the pay of town officers.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, on a written order from the Selectmen, to hire, on the credit of the town, such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the liabilities and current expenses of the town.

- Eighth. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, of the Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1911.
- Ninth. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the State highway.
- Tenth. To see if the town will repeal the vote of March 1, 1909, to build a steel bridge at Pleasant Hill, or act anything relative thereto.
- Eleventh. On petition of William E. Winslow and others to see if the town will rebuild the bridge at Pleasant Hill and raise money for same, or act anything relative thereto.
- Twelfth. On petition of E. F. Robinson and others to see if the town will vote to straighten that part of the road leading from "Carl O. Lund" to "Skilling's Corner," beginning at a point about half way up the hill and extending to the top of said hill near the residence of R. W. Lunt, and raise money for same.
- Thirteenth. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to procure a piece of land for a gravel pit for the Foreside road and raise money for same.
- Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to repair schoolhouse No. 6, and raise \$400 for same.

- Fifteenth. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the property of the late D. W. Hodsdon or act anything relative thereto.
- Sixteenth. To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as revised and prepared by the board of town officers.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said lists, at the town office, at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

School Report.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Falmouth:

I submit for your consideration the following report showing the condition of our schools and the progress made therein:

As the report covers but two terms, it will not be a long one, yet I feel that there is much in connection with our schools that is of interest to all. During the past year our schools have maintained a fair average attendance. They were somewhat broken up in the lower districts of the town by mumps, which was epidemic for several weeks. We also find in several of our schools two or three pupils who attend when they feel inclined, thus lowering the average attendance.

TEACHERS.

It was necessary to make several changes in our teaching force at the opening of the fall term. With one exception, only teachers of experience were employed, and through their efforts our schools have been successful. The selection of those who are to train our children at the formative period of their lives, is certainly a great responsibility. It is a duty that cannot be performed without a great deal of anxiety concerning results. We have many excellent teachers, those

who have had a Normal training or a large experience which has fitted them to do first class work. It is hoped we may be able to retain permanently all those who are progressive and possessed of high ideals.

COURSE OF STUDY.

A course of study was compiled by the Superintendent, approved by your committee, and placed in the hands of the teachers in November. This course can be carried out successfully in our Falmouth schools. In that course, "Elements of Agriculture" were introduced, believing that we should adjust our curriculum to the practical conditions of life. The education of the country child for life's work cannot be limited to the school arts—the three R's—but must be made broad, cultivating in them a taste for the beautiful in nature. Our school grounds, as well as the interior of our school buildings, should be made attractive. Our farmers are the most progressive men of the day; they are farming on scientific principles. In an elementary way our older pupils in our schools should know something about soil and plant and animal life.

TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

Books which were necessary to be furnished pupils who were promoted—the Aiton Speller for the grades above the fifth, and "Elements of Agriculture" for the ninth grade—have been the extra books purchased since the opening of the fall term. The Graves' Speller, used in the grades below the sixth, has been in use in schools for nearly twenty years. They were in a dilapidated condition and it was necessary to purchase new copies of the old, or adopt something new.

Your committee were of the opinion that it would be for the interest of all concerned to have the new. I should like to complete the change the coming year.

SCHOOLHOUSES AND REPAIRS.

Three school buildings have been thoroughly painted on the outside, viz.: Nos. 3, 5 and 12; also the interior of Nos. 3 and 5. One side of the roof at No. 2, has been shingled, also new closets built. Owing to depredations of bad boys, the windows at No. 4, were smashed out, which involved quite a little expense as well as trouble.

The coming year the roof at No. 5, will need shingling. The building at No. 6, (Woodville) is badly out of repair and needs a thorough overhauling. This district should have a better school building. The school is quite large and the prospect is that it will be for some years to come. I have no doubt but that the town will freely vote whatever sum the committee shall ask to make the necessary improvements. The teacher and pupils, with the cooperation of the parents in this district, have purchased a nice organ, cover and stool, also two large lamps for the room.

IN GENERAL.

The work the past year, as I have already intimated, has been well done. A special interest has been taken in several of our schools in drawing and writing. In many of our schools you will find exhibition work in all the grades. The best paper for the week in each subject is selected by the teacher and placed in a conspicuous place in the room. Parents, visit the schools frequently, look this work over and see what your children are accomplishing and the improvement they are making.

We have among the "little people" of our town some who cannot be surpassed by any pupils in our State either in city or country schools. Little ones, six and six and one-half years of age, who can add, subtract, multiply and divide, can write a plain, neat hand, can read understandingly in our first and second readers, and can write excellent little stories. This is something to be proud of and my desire is that those interested will make every effort to get public sentiment in relation to our schools tending in the right direction.

In closing my report I wish to make public acknowledgment of the cooperation tendered by committee, teachers and citizens in the support of the schools, and to all, including pupils, for the many kind and helpful words received since assuming this office.
