Warrant for Town Meeting.

*To JOHN F. WILLIAMS, a Constable in the
Town of Falmouth,*

GREETING :—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town, on the fourth day of March, 1912, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit :—

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, Assessors, Treasurer, and Superintendent of Schools.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, and the poor, and the repairs of roads and bridges and defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the pay of town officers.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, on a written order from the Selectmen, to hire on the credit of the town, such sums of money, as in their opinion, may be necessary to meet the liabilities and current expenses of the town or act anything relative thereto.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote yes, or no upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69 of the Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1812.

Ninth. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of highways and bridges, the sum of \$500.00 being an amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69 Public Laws of 1909.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to purchase of C. J. Fries, a piece of land containing about one-half acre, said land to be added to the school-house lot in District No. 6; and raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to pay for the same.

Eleventh. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a gravel pit for the upper road District and to elect a committee of three to purchase the same.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to purchase one or more snow-rollers and raise money for the same.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to sell the Geo. Q. Rose wood lot that was acquired by tax deeds and other claims.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to rebuild the culvert on Johnson road near H. K. Norton's Ice Pond and raise money for the same.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will vote to reduce the grade of the hill near the residence of William Nevins, formerly known as the Harland Merrill place, and raise the sum of \$300.00 for the same.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to improve that part of Blackstrap road known as "The Ledges," by filling

with clay and gravel; and doing such other work as may be necessary, and raise the sum of \$300.00 for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said lists, at the town office, at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT.

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Falmouth:

I respectfully submit for your consideration my second annual report.

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In the year just closing the same policy has been followed to make no radical changes without first studying the conditions until convinced it was for the best interests of the schools. The amount and character of the work accomplished in all grades has been very satisfactory. Never since I have been connected with the schools of Falmouth have the teachers worked with greater zeal to do thorough work, and following my suggestion, to develop a uniform standard in school work.

The attendance in most of our schools has been good. No cases of truancy have been reported.

Much excellent work has been done the past year in Arithmetic. Several of our schools have taken up a vast amount of oral work. The pupils have been required to analyze problems placed upon the board which has rendered them quick and accurate in computation.

I regret that the work in writing, begun last year by several of our teachers, has not been continued with the same

interest this year. The work in drawing has been satisfactory.

TEACHERS.

At the opening of the fall term we were obliged to make changes in schools No. 2, 7, 12 and the assistant teacher in No. 3. At the opening of the winter term a change was made at No. 10.

Our teachers are realizing more and more the importance and greatness of the work in which they are engaged. Teaching is an art that means more than knowledge; it is skill in using what we know. Unless the teacher has a strong love for her pupils she cannot have that influence over them, which is necessary in order to obtain the best results. The pupil imbibes the spirit of the teacher to a certain extent. If the teacher is unfriendly toward the pupil the pupil is sure to be unfriendly toward the teacher. One secret of a well ordered school is the refusal to accept any work except of the best quality. Children are like the rest of the world. They give us what we will take. To refuse to accept poor work insures work of good quality. Careful attention to what is to be required and careful methods in enforcing such requirements take us far toward a well managed school. If to this be added wise, sympathetic friendship of the teacher for the pupils, discipline will become fundamental rather than incidental.

The wisdom of retaining our experienced and Normal trained teachers has been fully demonstrated the past year.

Owing to a wise progressive school committee the minimum wages of our regular teachers has been placed at \$8.00 per week.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The new course of study has been given a thorough trial the past year, and pronounced a success by every teacher. We feel confident that a new standard of scholarship has been established, and teachers have not had to guess what

to do in this or that grade, as they have done in the past. One of the first discoveries made, as a result of the new course, was the one sided, unsystematic training which many of the pupils had received. This condition was more noticeable in the grammar grades. When teachers change positions, as often as they have to in some of our schools, and each teacher, in taking up her work in the school changes the course of study to suit her own pleasure, we should expect to find pupils who are strong in some studies and weak in others, according as the teacher is a lover of one or the other lines of work. Such is not the case, however, when an established course of study exists in the schools.

TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

The text books have received careful attention. We have made no introduction of any basal text, but have supplemented what we have with the best books to be found on the same subjects. This we believe to be the best course to pursue at present. It has been necessary to replace old worn out text books.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS,

The school buildings have been thoroughly renovated, and with the exception of No. 4, are in excellent condition. The interior of nearly all have been revarnished or retinted or painted. The work at No. 6 has been thoroughly done and it is one of the pleasantest school buildings in town. The people of the district appreciate what has been done. The building at No. 5 has been shingled. All the schoolrooms have been cleaned once during the year. The needs the coming year will be new closets at No. 7 and general repairs on No. 4.

Fortunately, no depredations have been committed by the "tough boy," hobo,—or whatever you are pleased to call him,—the past year; yet I would recommend the building of a strong locker in each school building as suggested two years ago.

GRADUATION.

The first union graduation held in town was that of June 16th 1911, at the First Parish Church. A class of nineteen was graduated at that time, twelve of whom passed the State examination successfully and have entered high school; and the principals of the different schools report them as doing well; our Falmouth students comparing favorably with the students of other towns; in some studies taking the highest rank.

IN GENERAL.

I have become deeply interested the past year, in the establishment of a domestic science and manual training school in this town. I hope to be able to create such an interest in this project the coming year that our citizens will see the value of such a school, and will vote the required amount for its maintenance. Six hundred dollars raised by the town will insure us eight hundred from the State. Our Normal schools are training teachers for this special line of work. Twelve hundred dollars will pay the teachers salaries, leaving two hundred dollars for equipment. The upper rooms in the Pleasant Hill school building are well adapted to a school of this kind; and six school districts can be conveniently accommodated.

The purpose of education is to train our boys and girls in those practical things that will enable them to act their part in life with the greatest measure of success. The conditions of life have greatly changed during the last few years. The schools which are successfully doing their work to-day are the ones which have met the new conditions and are furnishing their boys and girls with the knowledge and training which will be most helpful to them.

Let, us parents, pupils and teachers by co-operating together raise our schools to the highest possible standard. We all have a part in this work. I am sure it is a common interest that comes very near to us all.

In closing I wish to again thank all in any way connected with our schools, for their interest and help the past year.
