Warrant for Town Meeting.

To JOHN F. WILLIAMS, a Constable in the Town of Falmouth.

GREETING :---

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town, on the second day of March, 1914, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, Assessors, Treasurer, and Supcrintendent of Schools.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, and the poor, and the repairs of roads and bridges and defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the pay of town officers.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, on a written order from the Selectmen, to hire on the credit of the town, such sums of money, as in their opinion may be necessary to meet the liabilities and current expenses of the town or act anything relative thereto. Eighth. To see if the town will vote yes, or no upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69 of the Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1914.

Ninth. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of highways and bridges, the sum of \$650.00 being an amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69 of the Public Laws of 1909.

Tenth. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to sell the timber and wood on the town farm lot.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to sell the town farm, or act anything relative thereto.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to install hydrants along line of Portland Water District, or act anything relative thereto.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to repair Lamberts Bridge and raise money for same.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 to be expended on Presumpscot Bridge Hills.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will vote to accept the road leading from Carl O. Lund's to Skillins Corner, as defined and straightened by the Selectmen, a record of which has been filed with the town clerk.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will discontinue that portion lying between the property of D. W Lunt and the line as now straightened by the Selectmen.

Seventeenth. To see if the town will accept the Waite's Landing road, as laid out by the Selectmen, a record of which has been filed with the town clerk.

Eighteenth. On petition of E. L. Cobb and eleven others. to see if the town will vote to lay out a way or define the limits of the old road leading from Skillins Corner to Mussel Cove.

Nineteenth. To see if the town will vote to repair that part of the Duck Pond road between the foot of the hill near Chas. Purrington's to the top of the hill near U. R. Pride's and raise money for the same.

Twentieth. To see if the town will vote to rebuild the culvert on the cross-road north of Isaac Harmon's pasture, and raise money for the same.

Twenty-first. To see if the town will vote to have the bushes cut on the highways, and raise money for the same.

Twenty-second. To see what action the town will take in regard to paying outstanding notes or act anything relative thereto.

Twenty-third. On petition of Sewall P. Winslow, to see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to order the Road Commissioners to haul gravel for the mud holes in the roads right away after town meeting.

Twenty-fourth. On petition of Sewall P Winslow, to see if the town will vote to pay Sewall P. Winslow for the guide posts used in placing up the guide boards.

Twenty-fifth. To see what regulations, if any, the town will make in regard to fires, or act anything relative thereto.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said lists, at the town office, at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The following report is respectfully submitted for your consideration.

RECORD OF PROGRESS.

In conformity to the widespread effort to make school data more exact and valuable, the record cards recommended by our State Department were adopted and put into use at the opening of the fall term, Sept. 15th 1913. Under this system a card is made for each pupil the day he enters school. It gives his age, grade and standing in the school where he is registered. If the pupil goes to another school, either in or out of the town, he takes his card with him and he can be placed where he belongs.

The spring term was very successful under the corps of teachers as recorded in the tabulation. Good progress was made in all branches. At the opening of the fall term, which is the opening of the school year, it was necessary to make some changes in our teaching force. At No. 1 Annie L. Beard was employed to take Mr. Decker's place. Miss Lund was transferred to No. 6 and Vivia R. Sturtivant was elected for No. 4. Miss O'Brien, at her request, was given No. 8 and Miss Ethel M. Reed was employed for No. 12. Miss Blanchard was reelected as teacher of No. 7, but a better position was offered her in Rumford, which she accepted, leaving a vacancy there which was given to Marion H. Doyle. Good work was done during this term. Some of the schools have been interrupted during the winter term by sickness and the severely cold weather, otherwise the work accomplished, with one or two exceptions, will compare favorably with past years.

The hoped for improvement in spelling is slowly but surely coming; in several of our schools where our teachers have made a special effort to interest the pupils in this art, there is a marked improvement.

TEACHERS.

At the present time rapid progress is being made along all lines of education. If we wish to maintain our place in the front rank of rural schools in the state we must supply able teachers and adequate equipment, for carrying on the work. The teachers must prosecute their work with such interest and enthusiasm that the pupils will be made to appreciate their opportunities and the love of learning will be kindled in their minds. That we may have a corps of teachers able to do this, we must be able to pay saleries that will attract young people of ability to take up the work of teaching. Our town of Falmouth is doing well in regard to the salary question, but other towns are doing better, therefore it is hard for us to retain our best teachers.

Parents of the pupils in our smaller schools where we have employed, in one or two instances, inexperienced teachers, demand that we give them experienced teachers claiming they are entitled to the same as the larger schools. This is true; as we find in several of our smaller schools some of our best scholarship. In order to keep the pupils interested where there is but little competition, a teacher of tact and ability is required.

PROMOTION AND INDIVIDUAL INSTRUCTION.

We have, since preparing a course of study, given only annual promotions. Under this system several pupils of widely differing ambition and ability are kept in the same grade for the whole year with the result that the best pupils, always held back, waste time and often lose interest; while the backward pupils, hurried along faster than they are able to understand the work, lose interest and the courage to try. Frequently pupils are absent on account of illness or other good reason, or perhaps they are dull in one study, or possibly at certain times, necessary points are not made clear in their minds. This leads the parent to believe that a few hours individual work on the part of the teacher would enable such pupils to master the work gone over by the class during their absence. But from lack of needed help they are unable to understand the work, lose their standing in the class and their interest, sometimes fail to win promotion and not infrequently become discouraged and leave school.

It may be suggested that the teacher should find time to help the pupils who need assistance. They do in most cases so far as they are able, but with the present number of recitations little or no time is left during school hours. Our teachers have been interviewed in relation to this matter, and in justice to them will say that they are all willing, without exception, to remain after school and render such assistance as any pupil may need.

To obviate this difficulty to some extent, semi-annual examinations and promotions have been given in the seventh and eighth grades, where justice to all concerned could be done and where the teacher desired it.

TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

All the appropriation for text books and supplies has been used this year. The schools have been well supplied with books and necessary material to do good work in drawing, penmanship, geography and the elements of domestic science and manual training which we are carrying on so successfully. Our text books on the whole are in better condition than for several years as the books, which were completely worn out and of no value whatever, have been carefully sorted from the good books and placed by themselves.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

The usual number of incidental repairs have been made on all the school buildings. No. 7 has been thoroughly painted. The pupils, teacher and parents at No. 12 contributed the necessary funds to purchase a fine bell for the school building in that district. The belfry was built at the expense of the town and we are sure this improvement is one which is appreciated by the people in that section. A similar bell has been purchased for No. 5 through the efforts of the teacher and pupils and the generosity of the citizens, and as soon as the weather permits will be placed upon the building. No. 9 school building will need painting the coming year. The interior of No. 1 should be repaired. We would recommend that the ceiling be sheathed as the plastering is broken and badly defaced. A portion of the fence at No. 3 should be rebuilt.

Where the wood rooms are too small to store a year's wood it seems to your committee that it would be economy on the part of the town to build inexpensive buildings large enough to house a full year's supply.

PENMANSHIP.

The Zaner method of penmanship has been introduced and used successfully the past year. In schools Nos. 3 and 5 specially good work has been done as the teachers have labored hard to keep up the courage of the pupils and have them use the arm movement not only during the writing period but also while writing their language and spelling lessons. The lower grades are struggling with the problem of establishing the habit of arm movement from the start. The results in form are often disappointing to parents and teachers, but a considerable number of children have sufficient control of their muscles to enable them to do creditable work by the close of one year's practice.

GRADUATION AND EXHIBITION DAY.

The annual school exhibit of the work done by our pupils during the preceeding year was held at the Falmouth Corner schoolhouse Wednesday and Thursday, May 7th and 8th and at West Falmouth schoolhouse Friday, May 9th, These were the most successful exhibits we have had. A teacher's meeting was held Thursday forenoon, May 8th, which was attended by the teachers of Falmouth and several from Cumberland.

The graduation exercises were held at the First Parish Church, June 12, 1913. A class of ten passed the examination. Seven entered high school.
