# Warrant for Town Meeting.

### To JOHN F. WILLIAMS, a Constable in the Town of Falmouth.

GREETING :---

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town, on the fourth day of March, 1918, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, Assessors, Treasurer, and Superintendent of Schools.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools and the poor, and the repair of roads and bridges, and defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the pay of town officers.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, on a written order from the Selectmen, to renew its notes, and hire on the credit of the town, such sums of money as in their opinion may be necessary to meet the liabilities and current expenses of the town, or act anything relative thereto.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote yes, or no upon the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in section 19 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Ninth. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$864.00 for improvement of the sections of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount and how much, on all taxes paid before October 15th, 1918, and raise money for the same.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to accept the road leading from schoolhouse No. 7 to the County road near schoolhouse No. 8, as laid out by the Selectmen, a record of which is on file with the Town Clerk.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to accept the road leading from schoolhouse No. 7 to the County road near the property of Harry U. Fuller as laid out by the Selectmen, a record of which is on file with the Town Clerk.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to make a survey of the Portland and Falmouth line.

Fourteenth. To see what action the town will take in relation to the 200th anniversary of its incorporation, November 11, 1918, by raising a sum of money, or acting anything relative thereto.

Fifteenth. On petition of Harry E. Maxim and others, to see what action the town will take in regard to prohibiting the digging of clams for commercial purposes.

Sixteenth. On petition of E. F. Knight and others to see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to install two hydrants between Mill Creek and Skillin's Corner.

Seventeenth. To see if the town will instruct the assessors to include in their next annual report a list of the valuation of all property in the town.

Eighteenth. On petition of J. H. Shortill and others, to see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the repair of the Cobb road, or act anything relative thereto.

Nineteenth. On petition of Ulysses R. Pride and others, to widen the road-bed of the Mast road, so-called, in Falmouth, four feet, the same to begin at the Westbrook line, and to continue to the foot of the hill near U. R. Pride's, and to raise money for the same.

Twentieth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day, or act anything relative thereto.

Twenty-first. To see what action the town will take in relation to the claim of B. B. Small in relation to gravel pit.

Twenty second. On request of the State Assessors, to see if the town will vote to have a new valuation of the town taken.

# SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the town of Falmouth:

Again the time has come for a report of the condition of our public schools. It seems but a few short weeks ago that we were rendering an account of our stewardship in the same manner. The changing scenes thru which we have passed during the year 1917 make conditions so varied in all the walks of life, that our public schools have been classed with industries, commerce, etc. When the call "to arms" rang out over this broad land of ours, the country instinctively turned to our public schools for assistance; thus adding greater responsibilities to all connected in any way with our public school system. The preservation of our national integrity and honor has been uppermost in the minds of our people and while many of the boys in our high schools have volunteered and gone to the front the right conception of patriotism has been a question of serious thought in the minds of our public school teachers and pupils especially those in the grammar grades. The boy must realize that to do his bit now he must be regular in attendance at school and in the improvement of his time and his talents while there. The lack of fitness of many of our young men today for national service could doubtless be traced to non-attendance at school or wasted opportunities. Our task in all grades of school is to develop large, broad-minded ideals of citizen-ship.

"Patriotism is our sacred fire, and the existence of our state depends upon its ardent glow."

## TEACHERS.

All our teachers, with one exception, are either those of large experience or special training. The same appeal in regard to teachers' saleries must be made to the citizens of the town this year. We must pay our teachers more money or we shall be forced to close our rural schools. Only the superintendent and school committee can appreciate present conditions. It is almost impossible to get teachers at any reasonable price. They are seeking positions where they can get more pay. When a vacancy occurs in the middle of the year we are obliged to accept untrained, inexperienced teachers at the payment of salaries, equal or above, the wages paid many of our teachers who have taught in town with excellent success for a number of years. This seems to be unjust to those faithful servants and our citizens wonder why this seeming injustice. It has been the aim of the school department not to overdraw the appropriations and the records show that we have succeeded fairly well.

We have made but few changes, the past year, in the teaching force. At the close of the fall term Miss Foye of the Underwood Primary was succeeded by Miss Marion E. Woodward of Amesbury Mass. Miss Allen of the Woodville school by Miss Marguerette D. Cooper of Portland and Miss Ingersoll of the Hurricane school by Miss Viola A. Shaw of Windham. By the resignation of Miss Ingersoll, Falmouth lost one of its best teachers. It is the desire of the committee to retain the services of the present staff of teachers for another year, as a majority of the parents are satisfied with the work accomplished. The importance of the service rendered by a truly efficient teacher cannot be over-estimated. Such a teacher deserves the hearty support of every citizen. She should not only receive an adequate sala-

ry, but also such a degree of personal sympathy and encouragement that she may feel that her efforts in behalf of our children are being appreciated. The most satisfactory school systems are usually found in towns where the conditions of service are made so attractive that efficient teachers can be retained for a series of years.

## ATTENDANCE.

The schools, since the opening of the winter term, have been very much broken up by sickness and the severity of the weather. It is a maxim of school management that regular attendance is indispensable to satisfactory schoool work. We have had very few cases of truancy and under favorable conditions the attendance has been excellent. The spring and fall terms gave a splendid average attendance. During the spring term with a total attendance of two hundred twenty-seven, sixty-five were not late or absent. During the fall term with a total enrollment of two hundred thirty-six, seventy-three were not late or absent.

#### PROGRESS.

Good discipline, with one exception, has been maintained thruout the year in all the schools. Only two cases of corporal punishment have been reported.

Success has attended the efforts of our teachers in teaching reading by a plan, suggested at the beginning of the year, gleaned from methods used by our trained teachers. The lesson story is told by one member of the class. If the child began the story the previous day a brief account of that part is required. The pupils must study the reading lesson. The meaning of the hard words must be given. A list of new words in the lesson which the child cannot pronounce is brought into the class and written on the board

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divided into syllables and marked with the diacritical marks. The value of a thoroughly practical knowledge of correct English is becoming more important each year. Our high school teachers often assert that grammar is the most poorly taught of all the branches in the grade schools. Pupils enter the secondary schools fairly proficient in geography, arithmetic and history but extremely weak in the essentials of grammar. There are two reasons for this: first, many of our younger teachers, notwithstanding they have had high school and normal training, are still deficient in the study; and second, grammar is a difficult study and it requires a tactful instructor to give and hold interest. Our teachers are correcting simple errors in speech as soon as detected. The method in geography and physiology has always been satisfactory.

History should begin with our youngest pupils and be kept up for several years without a text book. Short history stories should be told each week for the benefit of the little people bringing out only one or two points for the child to remember.

Owing to our good fortune in having teachers in our grammar grades of several years' experience, the work in those grades in arithmetic is above the average.

Good progress has been made in writing and spelling. Agriculture has received the same attention as last year.

### SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

The new one-room building in the Pine Grove district was completed Sept. 1, 1917. This attractive building is one of the best. The most approved requirements regarding light and ventilation are fully met. The sanitary arrangements are good and the play ground is ample. The community may fairly expect the best service; both of those who care for the building and those who teach or direct the work of the pupils. A town's intelligence and public spirit is shown in nothing more clearly than in the way it provides for the education of its children.

Some improvements have been made in the school building at Falmouth Corner, but quite extensive repairs must be made the coming year. One side of the roof at No. 12 must be shingled. No. 7 needs wood-work revarnished and windows repaired. The interior of No. 5 should be retinted. The other buildings require incidental repairs.

Many of the parents are much interested in having musical instruction in ou rschools. The Parent-Teacher's Circle at Falmouth Foreside are enthusiastic over the matter and we have been assured of their hearty support in any movement in this direction. We have asked for \$125.00 for this purpose. We have never been in so favorable condition to carry out this project as at the present time. Owing to the efforts of the teachers and pupils and the generosity of the people, four pianos have been placed in our schoolbuildings the past year. One in the primary room at the Grave's school, one at Pine Grove school, one at the Falmouth Corner grammar and one at the Grave's grammar. The Underwood grammar was presented with a piano last year by Russell York, a former pupil and it has been highly appreciated and much enjoyed by all. The other schools, with two exceptions, have organs.

## TEACHERS' MEETING.

Our annual school rally and teacher's meeting was held at the Falmouth Corner school building and the First Parish Chapel, May 4th, 1917. In the forenoon a very helpful teacher's meeting was held in the primary school room. Papers were read on the following subjects:-

"The Backward Boy," Ethelynne M. Peabbles.

"The Smart Boy," Millicent A. Moses.

In the afternoon a very pleasing program was rendered by pupils representing several different schools. Supt. I. Z. Allen of Biddeford delivered a very helpful address.

The exhibit was superior to any we have held, showing advancement in all lines of work.

#### GRADUATION.

The graduation exercises were held at the First Parish Church, Friday evening June 8th, 1917, at 8 o'clock. A class of twenty-three graduated, twenty of whom entered high school. The following is the program:—
